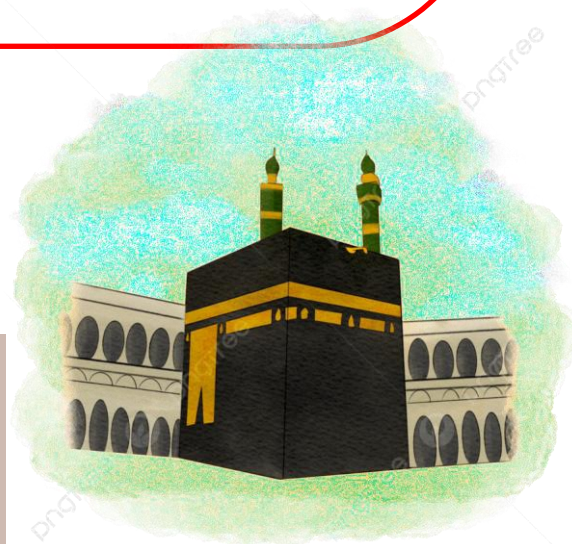
Key question: What does it mean to be a Muslim in Britain today?



Key Knowledge:

To know that...

- There are food laws in Islam where some food is Halal (allowed) and some is Haram (forbidden).
- Muslims all around the world interpret modest dressing differently and have different cultural expectations.
- Charitable acts and kindness to others is a fundamental part of Islamic life.
- Muslims dress in a modest way as part of their faith.
- There are special, traditional clothes that Muslims often wear for worship or religious celebrations.
- Muslims fast during the month of Ramadan (Sawm) to bring them closer to God.
- Eid al-Fitr is the Muslim festival that celebrates the end of Ramadan.
- Muslims give a percentage of their money to charity (Zakat).
- Muslims take a special pilgrimage to Makkah (Hajj) to visit the Kaaba

Key Vocabulary:

Halal: food that is allowed in Islam

Haram: food that is forbidden in Islam

Hijab: a fabric head covering worn by some Islamic women

Ramadan: the Holy month during which Muslims fast during the day.

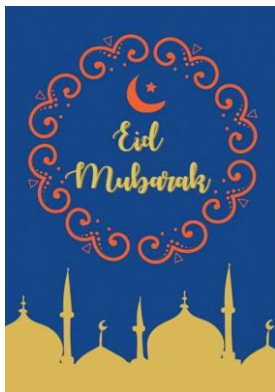
Eid: Eid al-Fitr: a religious holiday that occurs at the end of Ramadan.

Pilgrimage: a journey to visit a religious site.

Makkah - Islam's holiest city: the birthplace of Muhammad and the place that Islam was founded.

Zakat: the Muslim practice of donating a small amount of your wages to charity.

Sawm: the act of fasting during the Holy month of Ramadan.



Key People / Places / Phrases:



Makkah - the Holy city in Saudi Arabia that Muslims visit during Hajj

Kaaba - the ancient, Holy stone building at the centre of the Grand Mosque in Makkah.

Eid Mubarak - a celebration phrase for Eid al-Fitr that means 'blessed festival'
