This week, the Eco-Warriors have also started planting flowers. These will be kept indoors for now, but they are hoping that in a few weeks' time, the colourful blooms will be ready to brighten up our school.



A big thank you to everyone who has continued to walk, scoot or cycle to school, even with the terrible wet weather we've had recently. Your efforts really make a difference! Lots of children are on track to receive their Travel Tracker badges and add them to their growing collections – well done all!

The closing date for the [WOW Badge Design Competition 2026](#) has been extended - the deadline for submissions is now **Tuesday 3 March**, so there's still time for pupils to get creative.

WOW will turn each winning entry into 11 unique designs (that's over 300,000 badges), which will be awarded to WOW pupils who walk, wheel, scoot, cycle or Park and Stride to school in the next academic year. Last year, there were 200,000 entries, making it one of the UK's biggest design competitions for children. Our school could **win WOW resources up to the value of £500*** – which could mean free WOW for an entire year.

This year's theme is **Walk the Senses** so pupils are invited to take a moment to appreciate what's around them as they walk or wheel to school; to turn what they see, hear, smell, taste or feel into a colourful design. That might be the sound of birds singing or the smell of flowers – or perhaps the feeling of sun or rain on the journey to school.

Entry forms can be collected from the office or downloaded from the [Living Streets website](#) - completed designs need to be returned to us **by Thursday 26 February** so a BPSP shortlist can be selected. We look forward to seeing all the creative entries.

We reach the halfway stage of the academic year in good shape: all of our academic years have attendance that puts them in the top fifth of schools nationally. Year Four are our best attenders with an attendance of 96.49%. Thank you for your support in getting your children into school!

To underscore the importance of good attendance, below is a snippet from our Coastal Learning Partnership's attendance policy:

Overall attendance level	Number of days lost each year	Impact on child's education
97%+	5 days or less	These children have every chance to make really strong progress at school.
95%	10 days	These children benefit from strong overall attendance and are well placed to make good progress at school. We aim for every child to have at 96% attendance overall.
90%	19 days	Children in this group are missing a month of school per year; it will be difficult for them to achieve their best
85%	29 days	Children in this group are missing six weeks of school per year; there is a real risk that this lower attendance will hinder children's progress. Absence below 90% is considered to be persistent absenteeism.
80%	38 days	Children in this group are missing a year of school over five years of education. They are not benefitting from their right to be educated. Parents / carers of young people in this group could be issued with a penalty notice.

There is a clear pattern of attendance being significantly worse on the days immediately preceding, and those immediately after, Christmas, Easter, Summer and half term holidays.

Though it might seem like a good opportunity to take time off, please be assured that these are key times in the school calendar and are used for such things as: settling into new routines; launching new topics; getting to know a new working partner; having wellbeing hours; carrying out assessments (this year, Year Six mock tests took place in the week commencing 9 February, for example); enjoying the reward time that the children have spent all term working towards and performances.

Spotlight

On Tuesday 10 February, BPSP recognised Safer Internet Day 2026, during which the children took part in lessons using resources from the UK Safer Internet Centre. This year's learning was based around the theme 'Smart tech, safe choices – Exploring the safe and responsible use of AI'.



Please find below advice for parents and carers from the UK Safer Internet Centre about how to use AI technology safely and responsibly.

AI technology is increasingly part of many of our lives, so this Safer Internet Day we are starting a conversation about how to use it safely and responsibly. Use these top tips to help keep you and your loved ones safe online.

Enjoy going online together and talk regularly about your family's online lives

The internet can be amazing and can help us to access information and entertainment. Spend time online with your child to understand how they are using technology and talk together about the good and the bad parts of being online. Make sure your child knows they can talk to you about anything that they see or experience online.

Understand where AI technology is being used and the impact it can have

From summaries on search engines, to voice assistants and photo editing tools, AI powered features are being added to many of the apps and devices we use day-to-day. Look out for information and warnings notifying you where AI technology is in use or where content has been created using AI. Help your child to recognise these too. Remember, AI can make some tasks simpler but may also collect data about you and your family, or share unreliable information, so consider how to use it safely and responsibly.

Recognise what safe and responsible use of technology looks like

To use technology, including AI, safely and responsibly, it's important to reflect on the potential impact it can have on yourself and others. How does your use of technology make you feel? How can you use technology with kindness and respect for others? Does your use of technology benefit you or help you build skills? How might it affect you now and in the future? Ask these questions of your own internet use, as well as your family's.

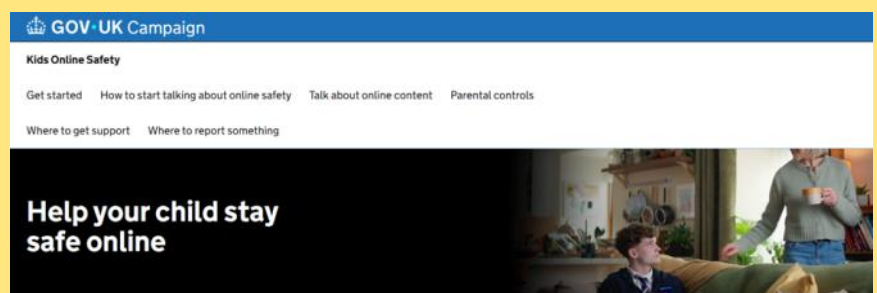
Know where to go for help if something goes wrong

Like any technology, using AI comes with risks. Some AI tools, like ChatGPT, have built-in reporting features where you can raise issues such as inappropriate or harmful content. Many social media platforms also allow you to report content you suspect has been created with AI.

Children's Mental Health Week - 9-15 February 2026

With the slightly unnerving statistic that 1 in 8 children and young people have a diagnosable mental health problem, here at BPSP we take every opportunity to promote thinking and talking about how to sustain positive mental health and wellbeing.

This year's Children's Mental Health Week was no exception. Our assembly this Monday was based on the theme of 'Belonging'. We thought about what 'belonging' means to us, how it is important to recognise that no-one is perfect and we should be accepted for who we are - 'belonging' is not about changing ourselves to fit in. Through discussion, we also agreed that the feeling of not belonging is not good for positive mental wellbeing and that we can help others' mental health by, 'Being somebody who makes everybody feel like a somebody'. Following our school rule, 'Be Kind' and showing our school values of Respect, Friendship and Compassion, would help us all help others feel like they belong.



At BPSP, mental health and wellbeing are always a priority for us, not just when a national awareness week comes around. If you are ever concerned about the mental health or wellbeing of your child, please contact your class teacher in the first instance. Teachers have details of a wide variety of charities and organisations which may also be of support.

Wellbeing On The Website

As new and different resources become available, so we upload them to our school website. There is a WELLBEING section under both PARENTS and CHILDREN where there are lots of useful articles, links and videos that may be of some support should you need it.

There are also firm favourites like the happiness calendar where, each month, lots of suggestions for wellbeing activities are set out. These can be a great go-to in any holiday when ideas might run dry. Putting your child in charge of organising a day of wellbeing activities for the family might be a good way to keep them happy and occupied!!

At Baden-Powell, we always dedicate the first hour back after any holiday to wellbeing so that the children can settle back into their classes before starting the new half term: both staff and pupils find this really beneficial. We will continue to think about the Zones of Regulation - another way in which we empower our children to think about their own mental health and wellbeing.

Yr 4 = Thursday 26 February

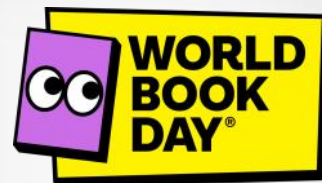
